CD 4 Candidates Take Stands on Wide Range of Issues from Reservoirs Development to L.A.'s Homelessness Crisis

At the only local forum scheduled in advance of the March 3 primary election for the CD 4 council seat, current Councilmember David Ryu and challengers Susan Collins, Sarah Kate Levy and Nithya Raman answered 20 questions about the most pressing issues

facing residents in the sprawling council district. The two-hour forum, which attracted a large and diverse audience, took place at John Marshall High School and was moderated by KPCC Senior Politics Reporter Libby Denkmann.

Attendees from Silver Lake were especially interested in candidates' answers to questions that touched on public access to the community's iconic reservoirs, which are currently under review in a Master Plan process. Sarah Kate Levy said she supported all of Silver Lake Forward's proposals to develop the reservoirs complex, which include new recreation facilities. Nithya Raman also supported more public access to the reservoirs and removing protective fences at both the Silver Lake Reservoirs and the Rowena Reservoir on Hyperion. Councilmember Ryu proposed using LAUSD school property for recreational activities during times when schools are not in session, giving residents throughout CD 4 more access to parks and recreation.

Other hot button topics included solutions for L.A.'s unhoused population, traffic issues caused in part by navigation apps like WAZE, SB 50, L.A.'s Green New Deal and historic preservation challenges. All candidates provided their positions on tackling the homelessness crisis, including Councilmember Ryu who pointed out that homelessness is a poverty crisis that no one person or agency can solve – but progress is being made by working together.

Kudos to LADWP and Traffic Control Officers

In December, the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power (LADWP) embarked on a thankless task: close the right-hand turn lane from Fletcher to Glendale Boulevard and one left-hand turn lane in order to replace aging water pipes on Fletcher Drive. However, thanks to excellent work by LADWP Trunk Line Construction, Crew B – and LADWP's commitment to keep traffic flowing with the help of experienced Traffic Control Officers (TCOs) – traffic has been moving as smoothly as possible. Currently, there are TCOs at four intersections in Silver Lake. LADWP also reports that pipe work on the project is scheduled to be completed by March 2. There will be some subsequent finishing work and the project is expected to be completely done by the end of April.

If you drive by a member of Crew B or a Traffic Control Officer, we hope you will give them a “thank you” for a job well done.

L.A. County's New \$300 Million Voting System Is Approved for the March 3 Primary – But Where Do We Vote?

Voting Solutions for All People (VSAP), the country's first publicly owned and designed voting system, has been certified by California's Secretary of State in California. That means registered voters are receiving information about the new process, which allows voters to cast ballots on touch-screen tablets at vote centers from 11 to four days before Election Day on March 3. We found it a bit challenging to navigate the many links and buttons and find out exactly where vote centers are located, so we compiled this roundup of the centers closest to Silver Lake.

There is **ONE** 11-day vote center in Silver Lake:

Rachel Fox, field deputy in Council District 4, reminds religious institutions, cultural centers and LGBTQ spaces in Silver Lake that funding to prepare for hate crimes is still available. Works Begins on New LADWP Modular Office

LADWP reports work to prepare for the installation of a new 60- by 60-foot modular office within the LADWP-owned reservoirs complex has begun. The unit will serve as office space for LADWP staff supporting the replacement of aging infrastructure. When the improvement project is complete, 25-30 employees will report to the modular office; parking for both personal and LADWP vehicles will be provided at the site.
