Silver Lake Together Issues Guide to Fourth Reservoir Complex Master Plan Community Meeting

The Reservoir Complex Master Plan now has a single design concept, which will be the topic of Community Workshop #4, taking place this **Thursday, 6:00 to 8:00 p.m.**, at **Friendship Auditorium**. This will be the last chance for the community to give input before the Master Plan Design Team starts work on finishing a final Master Plan that is expected to be presented early this summer. In response to a number of queries from Silver Lake residents, Silver Lake Together (SLT) prepared a short guide to the survey findings, design concepts and suggested improvements that will be presented on January 23. The guide also recaps questions that were not asked – or answered – in the latest Master Plan survey. For example, considerations such as the prospect of homeless encampments if the fences should come down, as seen at Echo Park.

SLT's goal is to help the community prepare for this complex and crucial meeting.

Mark Your Calendars and Apply for Speed Humps on January 29



At 8:00 a.m., Wednesday, January 29, the City will begin taking applications for speed humps. It is important to submit an application as early as possible, as the system only allows for 30 applications per council district. According to the City, speed humps serve as a deterrent to speeding on residential local or collector streets that have a single lane of travel in each direction.

The demolition of the historic Dodge House, designed by Irving Gill in 1914 and completed by 1916, sparked the historic preservation movement in Los Angeles. Considered one of the most architecturally significant homes constructed in the United States, this unique piece of domestic architecture influenced modern housing design, including homes in Silver Lake.

Annual Homeless Count Slated for January 21-23

Council District 4 reminds Silver Lake residents that the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority (LAHSA) is looking for volunteers to assist in the Greater Los Angeles Homeless Count, which will take place January 21 through 23. The data obtained from the count helps determine the amount of funding and services communities receive. According to the *Los Angeles Times*, the 2019 count found 58,936 homeless people living in Los Angeles County and 36,300 living in the city of Los Angeles.
