







On Friday evening, a car struck Barnaby, a two-year-old labradoodle, while he was being walked across the intersection of Angus and West Silver Lake. More motorists are ignoring stop signs at the heavily trafficked intersection.

Safety Issues Increase on Angus and West Silver Lake

Following an accident on the corner of Angus Street and West Silver Lake Boulevard, neighborhood residents are asking the city to take a closer look at safety issues at what many consider a dangerous intersection. Friday evening, Silver Lake resident Tony Michaelis was walking his labradoodle, Barnaby, across Angus when a motorist making a left from West Silver Lake onto Angus ran the stop sign and accelerated through the intersection. The vehicle struck Barnaby, who was on a leash, and narrowly missed

hitting Michaelis. Photos shown above document a stop sign that was apparently hit by another motorist and graffiti on other traffic signs. According to Michaelis, Barnaby was bruised, but not seriously injured, and is recovering. Michaelis reported the accident to LAPD and said the driver is being responsible.

In a separate Angus Street traffic issue, over 200 people have signed online and paper petitions asking the city to consider additional safety mitigations on the heavily trafficked street. Residents are concerned a proposed one-way designation will push traffic onto other streets, such as Micheltorena and Moreno.

Large Crowd Attends Community Meeting on Homelessness

Silver Lake turned out for a community meeting held on July 17 at Friendship Auditorium to see a presentation on the 2019 Los Angeles Homeless Count and to listen to panelists discuss their views on the homelessness crisis. According to the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority (LAHSA), which hosted the meeting, Los Angeles is the least affordable housing market in the U.S. and while thousands of people have been placed in homes, there has been a net rise in homelessness. Panelist Darius Derakshan, co-chair of Silver Lake's Homelessness Committee, told the audience, "I'm not an expert on long term solutions for homelessness, but I can say we need to have compassion and provide immediate relief like showers, counseling for medical and

mental health needs and concentrate on short term housing." The report takes a detailed look at causes of homelessness and population sectors that are impacted, such as veterans, families, youth, older adults and specific ethnicities.
